Hear-and-Say Reading Planning Worksheet

Remember! Great dialogic reading sessions always include:

- Introducing the title and author of the book. Point them out with your finger.
- Asking the children what they think the story will be about based on the title and cover.
- ✓ Using <u>each</u> type of prompting question when planning your story times.
- Following up your questions by acknowledging the children's responses, expanding on their ideas, and repeating key information.

Extension Activities:

- Conduct a survey to find out the favorite doughnut flavors/colors of the students. Use this information to create a tally chart or a bar graph.
- Look at the pictures of the doughnuts on the inside front cover of the book. Challenge the children to make repeating patterns using different colored paper doughnuts.
- Act out the story for families or other classes. Create props and have everyone decorate a doughnut. If you want to include more children in the activity, select additional animals to include in the story. Have children create posters to advertise their play. Design covers for a play program. Even have doughnuts for the audience!
