Hear-and Say Reading Planning Worksheet

Remember! Great hear-and-say reading sessions always include:

- Introducing the title and author of the book. Point them out with your finger.
- Asking the children what they think the story will be about based on the title and cover.
- ✓ Using <u>each</u> type of prompting question when planning your story times.
- Following up your questions by acknowledging the children's responses, expanding on their ideas, and repeating key information.

The first page of this book begins with: <u>One winter morning Peter woke up and looked out the window.</u> Helpful tip: For easy reference, use the prompt questions on the labels or photocopy them and attach them on the appropriate pages in the book.

Extension Activities:

- Create cards telling what Peter did in words and simple pictures. Sort through cards and try to recreate the sequence in the book. Use the arranged cards to retell the story together.
- Supply mittens, hats and scarves in the dramatic play area. Add white carpet for snowy ground and 3-inch white pompoms for snowballs.
- Build-a-Snowman Math: Create 10 piece felt snowman (2 white circles, black hat, scarf, two eyes, nose, 3 buttons). Children roll a die, identify the numeral and count out that number of felt snowman pieces. They each add the pieces of snowman to the felt board until they have completed it.
