

Hear-and-Say Reading Planning Worksheet

Remember! Great hear-and-say reading sessions always include:

- ✓ Introducing the title and author of the book. Point them out with your finger.
- ✓ Asking the children what they think the story will be about based on the title and cover.
- ✓ Using each type of prompting question when planning your story times.
- ✓ Following up your questions by acknowledging the children's responses, expanding on their ideas, and repeating key information.

The first page of this book begins with: Are you ready to play outside?

Helpful tip: For easy reference, use the prompt questions on the labels or photocopy them and attach them on the appropriate pages in the book.

P5: What is your favorite way to play outside? <i>Prompt Type: D</i>	P6-9: Do you think you are more like Piggie or like Gerald? Why? <i>Prompt Type: D</i>	P12-13: How do you feel about playing in the rain? <i>Prompt Type: D</i>
P13: What do you notice about this page? <i>Prompt Type: Wh, O</i>	P14-15: Piggie seems to be mad. Can you show me your mad face? <i>Prompt Type: D</i>	P15: Pouring is a word we use to describe rain. Can you help me think of a few more? <i>Prompt Type: O</i>
P18-19: How do you think Piggie is feeling right now? What about Gerald? <i>Prompt Type: O</i>	P20-21: Piggie says, "I am not a happy pig." How do you feel when things don't go the way you want? <i>Prompt Type: D</i>	P18-19: Notice the letters on these pages. How do you think we should read this sentence? Let's read it together. <i>Prompt Type: O, C</i>

P32-33: Let's name the animals on these pages. <i>Prompt Type: Wh</i>	P35: Have you ever thought something was not going to be fun and had your mind changed? <i>Prompt Type: O, D</i>	P40: Now how does Piggie feel about playing in the rain? How can you tell? <i>Prompt Type: O</i>
P40-45: Do you remember what Gerald and Piggie were planning to do outside when it was sunny? <i>Prompt type: R</i>	P56-57: What is Gerald doing? <i>Prompt type: Wh</i>	P55: What is your favorite weather to play outside in? <i>Prompt type: D</i>
