Hear-and-Say Reading Planning Worksheet

Remember! Great hear and say reading sessions always include:

- Introducing the title and author of the book. Point them out with your finger.
- Asking the children what they think the story will be about based on the title and cover.
- ✓ Using <u>each</u> type of prompting question when planning your story times.
- Following up your questions by acknowledging the children's responses, expanding on their ideas, and repeating key information.

Extension Activities:

 Paper Tube Tunnel Bridge: Tape paper towel tubes together (or wrapping paper tubes) so that you have a covered/tunnel-bridge.
Next, let the students put toys, like mini-cars in! Make sure the tubes are placed on a downward angle, so the cars are able to pass through the tunnel. The children can also pass under the bridge!



• Blueberry Muffin Math: Have the children sort the blueberries (pom-poms) and place them in the coordinating muffin liners. If you give them a small pair of tongs, they can work on their fine motor skills.
